

Come for a slice of style, a cup of inspiration, or a recipe on how to turn a tasteless, tired, and neglected kitchen into a banquet for the eyes! On Saturday, August 16th, the Bosco-Milligan Foundation will be serving up some courses of Portland's intriguing kitchen history at its **Fifth Annual Kitchen Revival** program. The lecture portion of the program will be held at the historic **Hollywood Theatre** at 4122 NE Sandy Boulevard, Portland, and will feature an accomplished group of speakers on kitchen history and design. Local chef and cooking instructor **Robert Reynolds** will be speaking on the history of Portland's Shogren House Museum and his plans to turn it into a place

where chefs come to learn about Northwest cuisine and then share their lessons with the public at a weekly Sunday supper in this famous Arts and Crafts bungalow.

Pegasus Design, Inc. owner **Robin Rigby-Fisher**, certified kitchen designer, will discuss how to work within a budget when working on a pre-World War II kitchen while retaining the original character. Two homeowners will recount their experiences with remodeling their own vintage kitchens and the different challenges and perspectives of working with contractors or doing-it-yourself.

TIMBERLINE THEN AND NOW LECTURE AND TOUR

Come see what is new and old at Timberline Lodge during an exclusive tour for the Foundation on September 27. **Linny Adamson**, curator for **Friends of Timberline**, will present a personal, behind-the-scenes look at one of Oregon's national treasures. The experience will begin with a slide presentation and question and answer session. After a break for lunch on your own, Linny will lead a walking tour of the entire lodge, including glimpses into the cozy overnight accommodations and conversations with craftspeople involved in the rehabilitation and ongoing stewardship. Optional activities include viewing the revamped museum and an art show featuring works in wood.

Built in 1936 by craftspeople employed by the federal Works Progress Administration, Timberline has become a Northwest

institution epitomizing handcrafted excellence. The exceptional craftspeople and artists who worked on the building then and now include carpenters, masons, blacksmiths, painters, carvers, and textile experts.

Linny has been working with Friends of Timberline since 1975 to preserve this living museum. This stewardship organization was formed by citizens to document, restore, and preserve all of the art and furnishings of Timberline Lodge, as well as its unique blend of sport and relaxation. **Sign on for the Foundation's trek to "every Oregonian's mountain home" by pre-registering with the coupon in the newsletter.**

INSIDE THE MASONIC TEMPLE LECTURE AND TOUR

North Wing, Portland Art Museum, SW Main and Park Avenue
Thursday, October 2, 2003 • 6:30 - 8:30 p.m.

Come behind the scenes to take a last "before" look at Portland's Masonic Temple, currently serving as the North Wing of the Portland Art Museum (PAM), before the start of its renovation. **Lisa Petterson** and **Peter Meijer** of SERA Architects, the local architectural firm working on the project, will describe the planned adaptive re-use and lead a tour of this magnificent building.

Built 1925-1927 at a cost of \$1,000,000, the fortress-like Masonic Temple served as the Grand Lodge for more than 20 Masonic lodges and affiliated organizations devoted to Freemasonry. Designed by the architectural firm of Sutton, Whitney, Aandahl and Fritsch, Fred Fritsch was the partner responsible for the building's design. Born in Portland in 1891, Fritsch ap-

prenticed at Whidden and Lewis, went on to work for Whitehouse and Fouilhoux and then was an instructor at the University of Oregon's School of Architecture. Known for his careful attention to detail, Fritsch's designs were avant garde for their time.

PAM completed acquisition of the building in 1994 from the Masons to serve as an adjunct to its 1932 Pietro Belluschi-designed main building. Upon completion of the project, PAM will use the historic structure and its three ballrooms for the new Center for Modern and Contemporary Art, the Northwest Film Center, Rental Sales Gallery, administrative offices, and the Rex Arragon Library. **This is a Foundation members-only program. The lecture program will be followed by self-guided tours of nine intriguing kitchens ranging from an 1898 Victorian, to 1906 and 1914 Craftsmans, to a late 1930s English cottage that are either close to their original character or are historically renovated. Highlighting this year's tour will be the original servants' kitchen of the 1917 Colonial Revival Wilcox Manor in Forest Heights - a must see! This program will provide historically-appropriate ideas and inspiration for all who have a kitchen renovation "on the front burner" and an up-close look for people who enjoy vintage homes in general.
